


TAMAGAWA JOSUI Scenic Road

A commemorative marker in the upstream section of the Tamagawajosui Scenic Road




The Tamagawajosui Aqueduct starts from the Hamura intake weir that lies beyond this. It was built approximately 360 years ago to form a weir feeding water from the Tamagawa River to the aqueduct.

Mure Garden

The cherry trees of Tamagawajosui Aqueduct are said to have been planted from wild cherry seedlings gathered by Kawasaki Heiemon around 1737, by order of the Shogunate.
